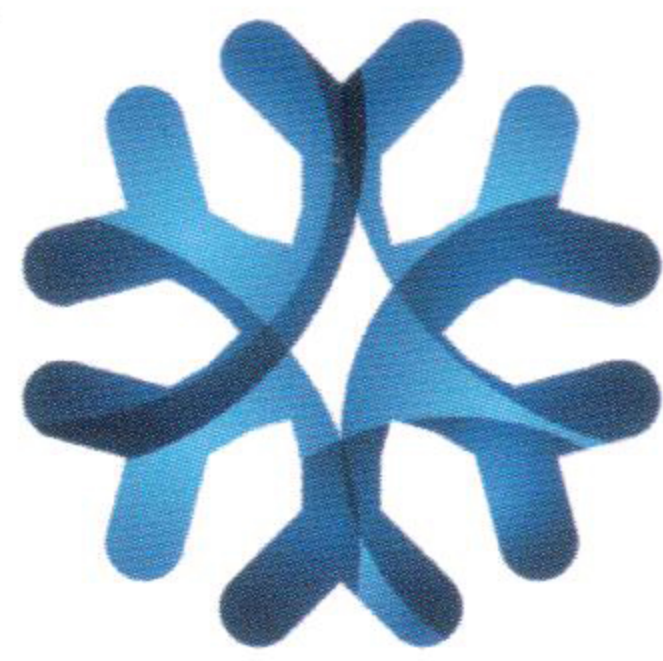

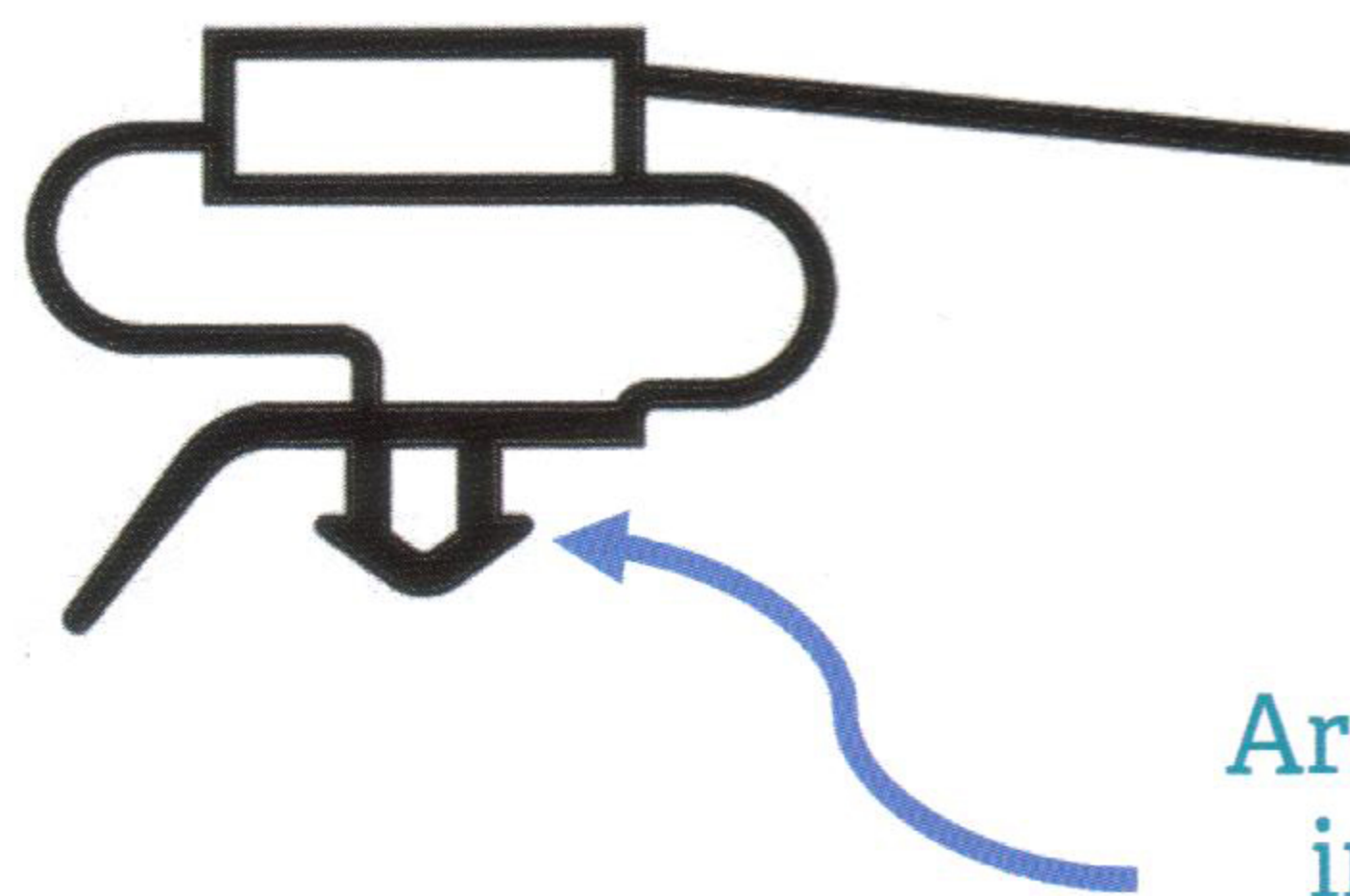

## Instructions for fitting Fisher & Paykel Press-in type seals

- Before removing old seal place new seal against old seal to ensure right size
- The back of the seal is slotted into a groove on the fridge door. The old seal should pull straight out of the groove
- Fit the new seal by pressing the seal into the groove. Do this by applying pressure to the front of the seal against the door. On the long side of the door it is best to start at the top, do a few inches, then work up from the bottom and meet in the middle. This prevents stretching the seal and ending up with an inch left at the bottom
- A fine smear of Vaseline on the surface of the seal down the hinge side will help to prevent the seal from twisting over
- If the seal is touching at the top and bottom and not in the middle, tape the door closed tightly with tape around the middle of the door and allow seal to get cold as they are plastic and will stay in the shape in which they get cold
